IT'S GAME ON AGAIN FOR RACKETS PLAYERS

Flood water from the River Ecclesbourne ruined all courts, inside and out, at Duffield Squash and Tennis Clubs during Storm Babet last October. The site was evacuated when several hundred thousand tonnes of water swept into the premises, ruining the gym, changing rooms and offices as well as all the squash courts and outdoor tennis courts.

But less than five months later, members are again enjoying superb playing facilities. While there is much still to do, six tennis courts and three squash courts have



been restored to pre-flood conditions, and the club is welcoming returning and new members. Led by members Nigel Williams and Andy Page, a recovery group was set up straight away to tackle the huge task, from the immediate salvage and pumping out operation to dealing with the insurance claim then liaising with the vital professional companies needed. Before any restoration work could begin, specialist firms were appointed to strip back walls, sanitise and dry out the clubhouse ground floor, cut, roll and dispose of sodden tonnes of contaminated tennis carpet, clean outside areas, and check out and repair floodlighting.

Within three weeks, tennis players were able to return, ... continued on page 5.

He has taken First Prize at the XIX Fryderyk Chopin Piano Competition for Youth in Szafarnia, First Prize at the XX Piano Competition "Young Virtuoso" in Zagreb, Third Prize at the Aarhus Piano Competition and, in 2021, was the semi-finalist of the Vendome Prize.

albeit playing on jet-washed tarmac bases which had been quickly marked with tennis lines until new carpet could be laid in two stages in the New Year. Squash members were not so fortunate, as the long dry-out period for the ground floor held back restoration of squash courts, and also the gym, until February and March respectively.

With the first floor unaffected, the bar could re-open fairly quickly, initially with reduced hours, and with some muchneeded and morale-boosting social events added in time for Christmas.

October's disaster is now being viewed as a potential opportunity to create a and modern welcoming community club for the future. with more flexible space, while maintaining the core sports of squash, racketball and tennis. Feedback from members is helping to shape possible alternatives to a simple restoration of the existing building. But built into any scheme will be flood mitigation measures to help as much as possible to protect a fantastic village asset for the years ahead.

THE CHANGING SEASONS ON THE MEADOW

Remember when you would send off your film to be developed and back would come the pack of prints - some of which will be of subjects you had long forgotten or that wonderful family moment? I have four very large plastic boxes - the ones you get from IKEA in which to store things - full of these treasures. Gathering together other random packets of prints, I rummaged through and came across the print you see below. It dates from many years ago when the Wirksworth Railway line bridge was having its surface replaced and the removing the tarmac layer of the A6 revealed what was underneath. As vou can see one side of the road at a time was being worked on. What made me want to take the picture was because I realised it was an event that would not happen very often and I was intrigued to see what the traffic was passing over every day.

What is beneath our feet has been of much concern over the past few months as we observe and worry about the sodden ground. Normally we do not think too much about the ground beneath our feet unless it is muddy or we have been advised not to compact the soil of our vegetable patches in winter by walking on our gardens.

This last winter many of us have had to take much more

notice of the extraordinary weather and farmers in particular are very concerned as they have waterlogged fields and have not been able to sow their normal winter/

early spring crops. There will be consequences for food production this year and the ability of many people to make a living.

Soil changes

will also affect nature in general - including our reserve. Just a quick reminder - one teaspoon of soil can contain more microbes than there are people on the planet.

There is one plant that more than relishes the wet although we would not want many more of them across our reserve because they set seeds prolifically. When the wetland was developed the one thing we did not bargain for was the appearance of many alder saplings (Alnus glutinosa) from the seeds blown into the area from the mature trees lining the Ecclesbourne. We did not worry at first assuming the rapidly growing tiny saplings would be easy to remove - unaware that the seedlings had very tenacious roots into the river gravels that formed the base of the

ponds making them almost impossible to dig out!

This remarkable tree can survive in adverse conditions like poor soils as it has a symbiotic relationship with a friendly bacterium

> called Frankia alni. The bacteria are hosted by Alder's the root system, forming large knots on root nodules, and then thev about converting airborne nitrogen in to soil-based nitrates. which nourish the

Alder.

Alders survive northern winters well although they can be short lived if grown in dry, stressful sites. As long as it has a moderate amount of water it can thrive even in heavily compacted soil. The outer bark contains reddish pigments and the inner bark yellow. When cut down the severed trunks are red/orange and the chemicals found in alders is used to tan leather.

The wood of this common alder does not rot in water and has traditionally been used to shore up canals, piers, wharves and riverbanks for millennia. Most of the pilings that form the foundation of Venice were made from alder trees.

Benefits provided to the aquatic food web comes from the alder foliage which provides shade for salmon and brown trout with decaying leaves decomposing quickly in the water which in turn provide nutrients for larvae of caddisflies, stoneflies and water beetles. Catkins provide an early source of nectar and pollen for bees, and the seeds are eaten by the siskin, redpoll and goldfinch.

This tree has an honourable. useful history. In Celtic Astrology - an ancient Druid belief system - the year is divided into 13 lunar cycles, each symbolised by a tree. The Alder symbolises the 18th March - 14th April and those born during this period are said to be path finders, adventurers, creators - with the tenacity needed to solve problems. Is that you? And the Alder has been around a long time. The oldest fossil pollen that can be identified as Alnus is from northern Bohemia. dating to the late Paleocene, around 58 million years ago. So whilst we might despair as the alder seedlings appear where we don't want them, the benefits of this tree outweigh the discomfort.

A recent national objective Biodiversity called Duty has been announced for all local councils. The aim is to increase the range of flora and fauna within our village thus enriching the lives of us all.


Before I became a councillor, I was unaware of how much land Duffield Parish Council held namely, Eyes Meadow, the



nature reserve, the cemetery and Greys recreational ground. In addition, subject to probate, the iconic historic pastoral land opposite Duffield Hall known as Parson's meadow has been bequeathed to the Parish. All these places create wonderful opportunities to improve and increase biodiversity.

Duffield is already so fortunate to have many beautiful green spaces and a caring community keen to volunteer in their upkeep. I draw attention to The Millennium Meadow Trust lead by the wonderful Di Hancock. The Duffield Community Association who fill our verges with wildflowers and the wonderful spring display of Daffodils. Mick Hardwick (Duffield Save Our Swifts) is dedicated to refilling our skies with these wonderful birds.

To begin the project for biodiversity duty and local nature Derbyshire



council owned land to plant trees, in particular trees. I have been visiting local community orchards in neighbouring villages with my fellow councillor and committee member David Walton. It has been inspiring and encouraging to see how a small amount of only ten fruit trees can make a real difference. The trees' blossom supporting our pollinators, leaves capturing carbon and then, hopefully, in time, providing a feast of fruit for



people and wildlife to share. We can't plant and then forget about these trees. They will need some care especially in the first few years so we are on the lookout for some tree guardians to help our parish council staff. These trees will belong to the village to be enjoyed by all.

Maybe in a few years we'll be eating apple crumble and making our first Duffield cider. Hopefully in many more years there will be large fruitful trees to provide shelter and shade for our children and grandchildren.



WILLIAM GILBERT SCHOOL SUSTAINABILITY SUCCESS









William Gilbert School are thrilled to share that we have now achieved the Green Flag Award with distinction! Our Eco-School values and our approach to environmental issues have been commended and it was recognised that our theme-based immersive projects are testament to how staff members have used this environmental focus to enrich learning in our school. The proactive **Eco-Committee** members, who are pupils elected by their peers, were praised for the way they keep our school community up to date on our progress and achievements. This is done through school assemblies, newsletters, posters and by collaborating with members of the local community and the Green Party. Councillor Alison McDermott came and met the ECO committee and gave them lots of excellent advice and support.

We have been extremely fortunate to obtain funding from the DCA to develop our KS2 Quiet Area which is located next to the junior playground. Historically this area has been used as a place for our children to chat and read quietly, away from the busy playground. Over time it had become weathered

and damaged making it a redundant space which was unusable for the children. So. at the start of the summer, we liaised with the DCA to discuss ways in which we could make the plot more environmentally friendly. After submitting plans, we received a grant, **Eco-Committee** and the enjoyed a trip to Hudson's Plant Centre to purchase plants and shrubs which will support biodiversity. Recycling at the TerraCycle Recycling Hub at William Gilbert School not only helps the community but also helps to raise funds for their pupils. The Recycling Hub is situated in the entrance to William Gilbert School and can be accessed between the hours of 8am and 4pm, Monday -Friday. Accessibility issues? Once you are outside the school, call the office on

01332 840 395 and a member of staff will come out and collect your recycling from you to drop into the relevant boxes in school.

The Recycling Hub currently accepts the following items:

- Pringle tubes
- Cheese packaging (any brand of flexible plastic cheese packaging, nets and pouches, any brand of sliced cheese protective plastic film, any brand of individual plastic cheese wrappers, labels from Cathedral City Minis packs of 6, any brand of plastic nets for mini cheeses)
- Warburton bakery recycling (Any brand of plastic bread bags and closure tags, any brand of bakery plastic packaging, (e.g. plastic trays, zipper bags, plastic packs, etc.)
- Biscuits and snacks packaging (all brands of non-savoury biscuit wrappers, all brands of cake wrappers, all brands of cracker wrappers)

Meet the DCA Executive
